Headmaster's Column

School year 2008-2009 has gotten off to a wonderful start. As we approach the end of the second week of school, I thought that we might look at some of the plans and changes that we hope will move us toward our vision of a twenty-first century Garden School. When we graduate the class of 2009 this June, we will be graduating our 80th class! And so much has changed since three graduates were given their diplomas in 1929.

This year we have begun working on another of new projects. We are about the file Part A of the application for the International Baccalaureate; we have established a communications committee to both put out information and to gather ideas; we have begun our own transportation company for busing our students to and from school; we have re-vamped the Dining Room menu; we have renovated part of the upper division; we have upgraded our salary scale; we have embarked on an ambitious program of faculty development; and we are moving Garden School much closer to a green environment.

These changes all represent our developing vision of the Garden School of the future. Some of this was made possible by our new tuition scale, some from donations—all of these changes, however, emerged from an environment in which the exchange of ideas generates the excitement and the enthusiasm to move from the thinking stage to the implementing stage. Parents, teachers, students, trustees, and administrators have together moved Garden School toward its future.

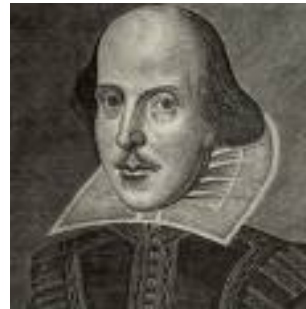
Shakespeare in the Garden

October 2nd is Theatre Night at Garden School for our 7th and 8th graders. They have bought out the house to see *A Midsummer Night's Dream* with their families and friends. In preparation for the event, students are reading the play in English classes to familiarize themselves with the plot and develop an ear for Elizabethan English. A workshop with our own Garden School parent, Josette Murray, will bring movement into the mix and enhance the Shakespeare experience. We are also anticipating a visit from a teacher/actor affiliated with Queens Garden Stage, the ensemble performing the play. Enthusiasm is running high as students read their lines with gusto and throw themselves into the roles of nobles, workers and fairies. Men in tights? "I wouldn't go that far," said one student, "but, it's a cool play. I never thought I'd like Shakespeare so much!"

There's a new non-profit performing arts organization in Jackson Heights called Queens Garden Stage and they are housed right here at Garden School. Their first production—*A Midsummer Night's Dream* by William Shakespeare—will have 17 performances in September and October. The production will take place on our stage. Queens Garden Stage offers educational programs and hires professional directors, designers and actors to bring quality entertainment to the community.

Early Childhood

Students in the early childhood cluster have been very busy since the first day of school. Those in the nursery have been working on their sharing skills. Manners such as please and thank you are being practiced as well. Children are beginning to recognize circle shapes. Everyone had a turn painting with water colors.

Pre-Kindergarten has been fostering independence. Each student has been working on name recognition and tracing or writing names. Following directions has been a challenge for some, while self expression of needs and wants is an even greater challenge for others. Routine is the key that helps all to feel secure and confident. They have been busy decorating their classroom with finger paintings, sponge paintings, and self portraits painted at the easel.

The Kindergarten students have been adjusting to their daily routines which include skills sheets, dictionary usage and new Math workbooks. They have enjoyed painting at the easels and having their work displayed in the classroom. The class has begun phonic instruction and discussions on the changing seasons. They are all excited to tell of their observations.

Merit Scholarship Exam Merit Scholarship Exam

"The Fleet is in!!!" "The Fleet is in!!!"

On Saturday, November 22nd, more than 100 students will converge on Garden School in Jackson Heights for the school's annual Merit Scholarship examination. Begun 16 years ago through Garden School's board of trustees, the Merit Scholars program provides up to four full scholarships to top candidates who take the exam and *can be worth as much as \$100,000 in Garden School tuition fees over a seven-year period.*

Founded in 1923, Garden School was the result of efforts by parents, teachers, and community leaders who wanted to create a school that places the academic and social interests of children at center. To this day, decisions about curriculum and academic achievement are made with students, not politics, in mind.

Garden School is an independent, co-ed, secular, college preparatory school that spans Nursery through 12th grade. Ninety-nine percent of Garden School's students go on to college immediately after graduation. And all of this takes place within a diverse, international environment in which there is no single majority.

The Merit Scholars program provides full and partial scholarships to students who will attend Garden School the following year, in grades 6 through 10. *This means that students who are currently in grades 5 through 9 are eligible to take the exam.* Thus, a student winner entering Garden School as a 6th grader can expect to receive their scholarship award for seven years covered by the program. Current Garden School students, as well as students who attend other schools, are welcome to register for the exam.

Winning students need to maintain a B average, be good citizens of the school, and participate in the school's community service program to ensure that the scholarship continues over the years. Recent winners of the scholarship at Garden School have gone on to such universities and colleges as Harvard, Dartmouth, NYU, MIT, and Cornell.

Lower Division Highlights Cont'd...

Grades 1,2,3

Our Citizenship theme this year has been discussed in First, Second and Third Grades. First Graders have been conferring on the importance of using rules. Students worked cooperatively to establish a set of class rules. Important rules agreed upon included listening to others when they speak, following directions, respecting others and their belongings, and trying your best.

Second Grade divided into teams to identify a way to make our school a better place. Each group then gave a presentation to the rest of the class. Some ideas included making sure each class was recycling, having more plants in the building, and treating others nicely.

Third Grade is focusing on how an individual's actions affect the classroom community. When one student is unfocused the rest of the class and the teacher are affected. The class is reminded of the importance of being responsible for one's own actions and thinking how others will be affected by their actions.

In conjunction with the theme of citizenship, science classes have been focusing on responsibility as it pertains to our environment. Conservation International and the Association of Zoos and Aquariums have named 2008 as the Year of the Frog because of the danger the amphibian population faces world wide. In addition to our science curriculum, students will be learning about the far reaching effects of pollution and global warming on our little green friends.

Grades 4,5,6

Fourth, fifth, and sixth graders have been writing reflective paragraphs about the meaning of being an effective citizen. This was linked to the ideas of citizenship and community which were topics of the summer readings. In those books major characters volunteered in their communities. Current class readings such as *Hope Was Here*, *The Cay*, and *Class President* center on this year's lower division theme of citizenship and community.

After School Foundations

On the heels of the successful launch of our first year of "Foundations" courses, the Fall '08 line up promises not to disappoint you. Classes are scheduled to begin the week of October 6th and we're happy to report that they are quickly filling up.

This year's array of specialty classes are geared toward the varied interests of our students, they are exciting, and will broaden a student's awareness in a multitude of areas.
